Why study Spanish?

A Level Spanish continues to build on the skills gained at GCSE with stimulating content to enable students to develop their linguistic skills alongside their understanding of the culture and society of the countries in which Spanish is spoken - from current affairs (such as technology, politics, role models in society, etc.) to national identity (past and present) of the Hispanic society. Students will study texts and film and will have the opportunity to carry out independent research on an area of their choice
